ONCE—Gospel Christianity is not a matter of following a set of rules. In fact, the gospel is not about what we do but rather about what Christ has already done. There's an old story about a man who fell down a well. When he called out for help a passerby, hearing his cries, leaned over the well and asked him what he wanted. The man said he wanted to get out. The passerby thought for a moment and finally took out some paper and wrote something on it and dropped it down into the well. When the man picked it up, he read "Ten Rules on How to Keep Out of Wells". Religion is like that. It tells us that we must do something to get out of the well we've fallen into. However, that is NOT the Gospel. The Gospel tells us of a Saviour who has appeared ONCE to put away the deep well of sin by the sacrifice of Himself. ONCE, only ONCE. Hebrews 9:26, "For then must he often have suffered since the foundation of the world: but now once in the end of the world hath he appeared to put

Jesus was and is unique. No one had been like Him in the past, no one can match Him in the present and no one will surpass Him in the future. There were priests and prophets back in the Old Testament yet none of them could bring salvation to their people. But the ultimate priest, Christ Jesus, appeared ONCE and saved us by His doing, dying and rising again.

away sin by the sacrifice of Himself."

There is no one like Him; no church, no priest and no bishop can make a sacrifice for our sins. Why? Because Jesus appeared ONCE to put away sin (literally abolish sin). The hymn writer put it this way:

> Not all the blood of beasts On Jewish altars slain, Could give the guilty conscience peace Or wash away the stain. But Christ, the heav'nly Lamb, Takes all our sins away; A sacrifice of nobler name And richer blood than they.

His putting away of our sins happened ONCE. The scriptures are clear, only a blood sacrifice can put away sin; Hebrews 9:22, "And almost all things are by the law purged with blood; and without shedding of blood is no remission." --MM

My answer was, "I really don't know." The messenger continued to ask if anyone in doubt desired to know for sure about his or her eternal destiny. I certainly wanted to know that heaven was my home, but something inside said, "Knot today!" Paul preached to a man named Felix in Acts 24. His response was like mine— "Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee." Mistake! I have seen the same in the faces of people when the truth is presented to them. How dangerous it is to refuse the urging of the Holy Spirit when He knocks at your heart! SLEEPING WHILE THE SHIP SINKS—"So the shipmaster came to him, and said unto him, What meanest thou, O sleeper? "...WHAT MANNER OF MAN IS THIS..."—"...that even the wind and the sea obey him?" (Mark 4:41). The disciples were exhausted. They had tried everything and yet their boat was continuing to sink. Then they turned to Jesus and called on Him for help. He instantly calmed the raging storm, and the mariners were stunned at His authority and majesty. Mark 4:41 poses a great question—what manner of man is this man Jesus? Let's call some witnesses to testify on His behalf.

PREPARING FOR JULY 4—In his Farewell Address, President Reagan admonished us by remarking on his pride in the great resurgence of patriotism during his time in office. All great change in America begins at the dinner table. So, tomorrow night in the kitchen I hope the talking begins.
